Know the Bush Fire Alert Levels



Advice - A fire has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes.



Watch and Act - There is a heightened level of threat. Conditions are changing, and you need to start taking action to protect yourself and your family.



Emergency Warning - An Emergency Warning is the highest level of Bush Fire Alert. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk.

Fire Danger Ratings

Your safety and survival may depend on the decisions you make, even before there is a fire.

Monitor the Fire Danger Ratings daily at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/fdr. The higher the fire danger rating, the more dangerous a fire is likely to be.

The new Fire Danger Ratings have four levels (formally six) Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic and provide a clear indication of the fire if one was to start. The higher the fire danger rating, the more dangerous the conditions.

Fire Danger Rating	What you should do
CATASTROPHIC	For your survival leave bush fire risk areas
EXTREME	Take action now to protect your life and property
HIGH	Be ready to act
MODERATE	Plan and prepare

Status and Alert Levels

Status & Alert Levels What you should do An Emergency Warning is the highest level of **EMERGENCY** Bush Fire Alert. You may be in danger and WARNING need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk. There is a heightened level of threat. Conditions **WATCH & ACT** are changing and you need to start taking action now to protect you and your family.

During bushfires it is important to monitor conditions and keep up to date with the latest emergency information.

A fire has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes.



Total Fire Bans



Total Fire Bans are declared on days when the weather is very hot, dry, and windy, typically when the fire danger rating is Extreme or Catastrophic.

These bans help prevent fires from spreading and causing damage to life, property, and the environment.

A Total Fire Ban means no fires in the open. aimed at limiting the potential for fires to develop.

During a ban, you cannot light, maintain, or use a fire in the open, nor carry out activities that could cause a fire, such as welding, grinding, or using any equipment that produces a spark.

It's also advisable to avoid using tractors or slashers, as these activities might start a fire on your property.

While electric and gas barbecues can be used under strict conditions, solid fuel barbecues and pizza ovens are not allowed outside during a ban.
